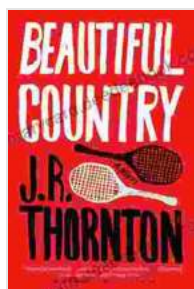


Beautiful Country: A Novel by Ann Patchett

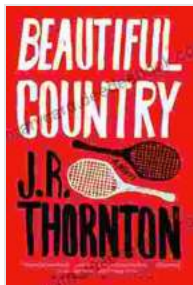

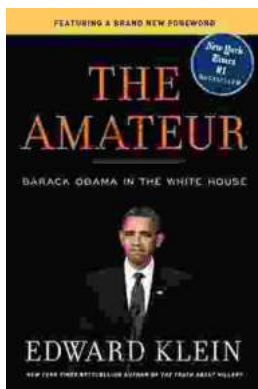

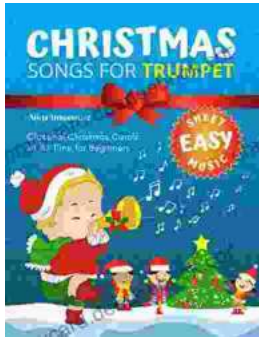
