

Teaching Music with Promise: Peter Loel Boonshaft's Legacy and Contributions to Music Education



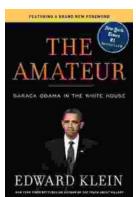
