

Worst Best Friend Ever: A Tale of Love, Lies, and Betrayal

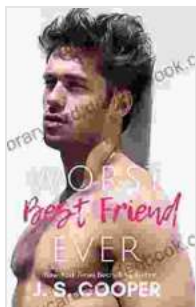

True friends are hard to find, but they're worth their weight in gold. Don't settle for anything less.

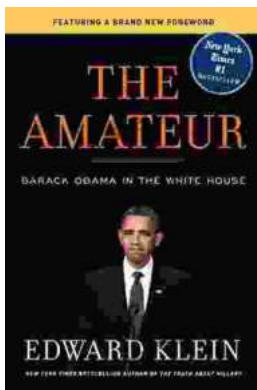


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
